Most UW courses are assessed as a credit of 0.5 and are approximately 39 teaching hours per term. Some courses may include supplementary tutorials (TUT) or labs (LAB) in addition to lectures (LEC). Details of specific credit weights and teaching hours per course are available via the Schedule of Classes.

F. Visa

Consular/Visa Regulation

It is your responsibility to obtain the correct documents from Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) prior to your exchange semester(s) in Canada.

Depending on nationality, students may need any other following documentation **before their arrival** in Canada:

- (a) Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA) As of March 15, 2016, visaexempt foreign nationals are expected to have an Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA) to fly to or transit through Canada. Exceptions include U.S. citizens, and travellers with a valid Canadian visa. To find out if you need an eTA prior to your exchange, please refer to the following link. http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/visit/visas.asp
- (b) Visitor Visa If you do not qualify for an eTA, you will need to obtain a Visitor Visa prior to your arrival in Canada. Please contact the High Commission of Canada in Singapore to start the process of obtaining the appropriate visa. The High Commission Officer might advise you to obtain a Study Permit instead since your time in Canada is primarily for studying. To determine if you need a Visitor Visa, please refer to the following link, http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/visit/index.asp
- (c) **Study Permit** Study Permits are usually reserved for students studying more than 6 months at a Canadian institution. To be eligible for a Study Permit, students must.
 - have been accepted by a designated learning institution in Canada.
 - prove that you have enough money to pay for your tuition fees (no applicable for SEP), living expenses for yourself and any family members who come with you to Canada and return

transportation for yourself and any family members who come with you to Canada.

- be a law-abiding citizen with no criminal record and not be a risk to the security of Canada. You may have to provide a police certificate.
- be in good health and willing to complete a medical examination, if necessary.
- satisfy an immigration officer that you will leave Canada at the end of your authorized stay.

G. Safety, Health & Medical Insurance

i) Health/Medical Insurance

All registered NUS students are covered under the university health insurance and the blanket travel insurance. For more information on the university health insurance coverage, please refer to http://www.nus.edu.sg/finance/docs/FAQs.pdf

If the insurance coverage is not enough, students are advised to purchase additional health and/or travel insurance from their preferred agent.

Once accepted to UWaterloo, international students are required to purchase medical and hospital insurance through the University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP) and the Health & Dental Plan administered through UWaterloo's FEDS/GSA Health & Dental Plan Office. The applicable health insurance fees will be posted on the students' Quest account approximately one month prior to the beginning of the respective term.

Approximate rates per term are as follows and are subject to change:

- UHIP CAD\$204
- FEDS/GSA Health & Dental CAD\$182

UHIP coverage is compulsory. However, students may be able to opt out of the supplementary FEDS/GSA Health and Dental Plan if they have adequate coverage through another insurance provider. Students may visit the FEDS/GSA Health and Dental Plan office (located in Health Services rm. 1106)
