

NUS Bizad Charity Run raises over S\$140,000



SINGAPORE – Gymnast Lim Heem Wei, the first Singaporean in the sport to compete in the Olympics, was among more than 1,300 National University of Singapore (NUS) staff, students and alumni who took part in the NUS Bizad Charity Run today (Jan 10) to help raise over S\$140,000 for Assumption Pathway School (APS) students and financially needy NUS business undergraduates.

SINGAPORE – Gymnast Lim Heem Wei, the first Singaporean in the sport to compete in the Olympics, was among more than 1,300 National University of Singapore (NUS) staff, students and alumni who took part in the NUS Bizad Charity Run today (Jan 10) to help raise over S\$140,000 for Assumption Pathway School (APS) students and financially needy NUS business undergraduates.

The NUS Bizad Charity Run, which is into its fifth year, sees participants compete in the 5km fun run or 10km race through the university's Kent Ridge campus.

Also attending the run today were Senior Minister of State (Finance and Transport) Josephine Teo, Singapore's "Blade Runner" Shariff Abdullah, and 85-year-old Chan Meng Hui, the event's oldest participant.

Lim, 25, who took part in the 5km fun run, became the first Singaporean gymnast to compete at the Olympics when she featured at the 2012 London Games.

Chua Beng Hwee, chairperson of this year's NUS Bizad Charity Run and an alumni of the NUS Business School, said the run was a fitting way to help commemorate the 50th anniversary of the NUS Business School.

"For this year's edition of the NUS Bizad Charity Run, our focus is on helping underprivileged youths in Singapore achieve success," said Chua.

"We are thus donating some \$40,000 to APS to further encourage APS students to dream big despite the challenges they face."
