Kamala Club donates \$100,000 to NUS

The club is supporting the education of female Indian Singaporean students

THE Kamala Club, Singapore, has donated \$100,000 to the National University of Singapore (NUS) in support of the education of female Indian Singaporean students.

The club handed over the cheque in a ceremony at NUS on June 30.

The runds will involve the establishment of the Kamala Club Singapore Medal and will also provide bursaries for needy female Indian Singaporean students at the university.

The medal will be awarded yearly, starting from July next year, to the best performing graduating female Indian Singaporean student at NUS.

A bursary will also be awarded each year, starting from the new academic year this August.

The club's president, Mrs Raja Chowdari, told tabla!: "Being a ladies club, we thought of supporting female students. With limited resources, we could think of only local Indian students...

"The medal will be given to the best undergraduate and the bursary will be awarded to needy students."

The money from the club was raised over the years through various programmes such as classes in cooking and dancing.

Said NUS president Tan Chorh Chuan: "We are pleased that The Kamala Club, Singapore, has chosen NUS as a recipient of its philanthropic

The gift will enable outstanding but financially needy young Singaporean women to study at NUS, and to fulfil their potential and eventually make a positive impact on society.

'We hope that the generosity of The Kamala Club, Singapore, will also inspire others to join us in further enhancing access to a transformative university education."

Said Mrs Chowdari: "Having already donated some funds to the Singapore Indian Education Trust, we thought of donating to one of the premier universities in Singapore — NUS."

The Kamala Club, Singapore, is a non-profit organisation that promotes social, charitable, humanitarian and cultural support for the local Indian community and various underprivileged groups in Singapore.
